Dr. David Wick worked for over 20 years at 4 U.S. universities to support international education programs. Now, as Associate Professor and Chair of the International Education Management at the Middlebury Institute in Monterey, California, he teaches graduate courses on educational equity and

social justice, student learning and development, program design and assessment, and other topics. He researches and publishes on equity and inclusion in international education. He serves in leadership positions with Diversity Abroad, *Frontiers: The Interdisciplinary Journal of Study Abroad*, and the Nobel Future Leaders Scholarship Program.

Agnes Stinson Roche

As a Middlebury C.V. Starr Schools Abroad CT Fellow, Agnes works with Middlebury International Programs administrators and Schools Abroad Directors on CT project development and grant reporting. A graduate of Middlebury College ('24), Agnes studied Political Science and Francophone Studies in Vermont and abroad at Sciences Po Bordeaux. As a student, she was the CT intern at the School in France where she began and has since continued supporting CT orientation design, training site Directors on CT in international education and helping to make CT more accessible to students, faculty and staff around the world. Agnes is currently pursuing her master's in public policy at Sciences Po Paris where she hopes to apply transformative approaches to gender and immigration policy challenges.
